2008 SEASON PREVIEW



Washington & Jefferson College Head Coach Mike Sirianni reflected on the 2007 Presidents' football season with a smile on his face.

W&J collected its third undefeated regular-season since 2000 and its ninth overall in school history. The Presidents won their 22nd Presidents' Athletic Conference title, including the 19th in the past 23 seasons.

However, a stinging 35-34 home overtime loss to North Carolina Wesleyan in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs will set the tone once the 117th preseason camp in school history starts on August 15th.

"That loss took awhile for us to get over," said Sirianni, ranked third on the NCAA Division III active coaches winning percentage list (50-8, .862). "In reality, it isn't any different than any of our other recent end of the season losses though. We didn't reach our ultimate goal, but we did have a tremendous year and no one can take those accomplishments away."

Sirianni returns 58 letter winners, including 22 seniors, to Cameron Stadium this fall with high hopes of getting back to the point where last year's season ended.

"Having 22 seniors is very unique in today's world of NCAA football,"

added Sirianni. "Most of these seniors have played just about every game for the past three years. They have lost two regular-season games in their careers and they certainly don't want that number to increase."

The Presidents, who have won 19 consecutive regular season games, will be led by a high-powered offense which ranked second in the nation last year in total offense with a school-record 518.7 yards per game. W&J also finished fourth in NCAA Division III with 46.2 points per contest.

W&J has been ranked as high as No. 2 (The Sporting News) in preseason polls. For a program that has won the second-most games in Division III history (646-367-40), expectations are always high in August.

"In 2004, we advanced to the national quarterfinals and were ranked at the bottom half of the polls in the preseason," said Sirianni. "We had very high expectations in 2002 and 2005 and we bowed out early in the playoffs. The best teams will rise to the top near the end of the season."

Directing the offense for a third-straight season will be senior quarterback Bobby Swallow. Swallow has completed 402-of-578 career passes for 5,242 yards (4th in W&J history) and 67 touchdowns (3rd in school history). Last year, Swallow completed 229-of-331 pass attempts for 3,106 yards and 46 scores. He was intercepted only three times.

"It is going to be hard for Bobby to improve his numbers from a year ago, because he played so well," noted the sixth-year head coach. "However, we want to play our best football during our senior years and Bobby will do that. He will be the first one to tell anyone that we can improve our wins in the playoffs. That is what he is motivated by."

The key to the offense's success will be the players blocking in front of Swallow. Two W&J senior linemen, right guard Matt Houy and center Dave Bucar, have been named D3football.com Preseason All-Americans. The Presidents also return junior left tackle Kirk Fulton and will look from another large group to fill the left guard and right tackle positions lost to graduating players.

"Matt and Dave are both three-year letter winners who have started every game over the past two seasons," added Sirianni. "We believe the offensive line can be the strength of our team. These guys have worked hard to get to this point in their career and we expect them to dominate opponents."

Sirianni believes the open starting positions will come from a group that includes seniors Brandon Kosco and Tyler Wilson, juniors Pat Denecke, Jacob Hornick and Matt Montenero and sophomores Jacob Link, Jordan Thompson and Adam Zampatti.

Senior running backs Kevin Mathews and Curt Jones combined to rush for over 1,700 yards and will once again be the featured backs in 2008. Mathews gained 991 yards and scored nine touchdowns, while also catching 32 passes (3rd on team) for 424 yards and six scores. Jones rushed for 738 yards and crossed the goal line seven times. Both running backs are also dangerous kick returners.

Sirianni is also excited about the depth at the position as junior Terrence McAllister (278 yds., 2 TD) and sophomore Derek Taylor are young talents who are waiting for the chance to carry the football.

"Kevin and Curt are going to play more on the field at the same time this year," noted Sirianni. "We want to involve them even more in the passing game. We expect more out of them because they are going to have to play their best or our younger players will get their opportunity."

The wide receiving corps loses the team's top threat, Tom McCafferty, but returns four players who caught at least 12 passes a year ago. Senior David Ravida has quietly produced solid numbers over the last two years with 106 receptions for 1,224 yards and 12 touchdowns. He enters his senior season 22 catches away from moving into fourth place on the all-time list. Senior Ryan Church, a converted quarterback, became a big-play threat as he hauled in 28 passes for 364 yards and seven touchdowns. Senior Luke Espe (12-155-4) and junior Craig Besong (19-233-5) will be more targets for Swallow, while a host of other young players will vie for opportunities in the five-wide sets. Senior Josh Rodgers and junior Paul Boyagoda will serve as the tight ends.

"Our receivers always find a way to step up and replace those we have lost to graduation," said the 36-year-old head coach. "We have lost the top five receivers number-wise in school history over the last eight years and we have always had different players have great seasons. I expect that tradition to continue."

The Presidents' defense will have a different look in 2008 as Casey Goff and Matt Caponi take over as Co-Defensive Coordinators. Goff spent his first season on the staff in 2007 as the defensive line coach, while Caponi accepted the promotion after two years coaching the Presidents' defensive backs.

"We are looking forward to seeing what Coach Goff and Coach Caponi can do with our defense," added Sirianni. "We are going to show some different looks and change our philosophy a bit. These two coaches are ready for the challenge."

The unquestioned leader of the defense is junior linebacker David Gitlitz. Gitlitz will start for the third-straight season in the middle of the defense and will be joined by returning starters senior linebacker John Fahey (79 tackles, 2 sacks) and sophomore linebacker Zach Pugliese (28 tackles). Gitlitz has improved steadily each of the past three seasons and is 87 tackles shy of becoming the third player in school history to amass 300 career stops. In addition to Fahey and Pugliese, Sirianni is also excited about sophomores Jon Pugh, Nick Resnik and Sal Ruggeri.

"David has been a great player throughout his career for us," added Sirianni. "Last year, he was a great player on an average defense. We need him to be a great player on a great defense. I expect John to play to his full potential this year, because he is a great athlete. Zach performed well in his first season."

Senior cornerback Chris Kessler and the brother safety combination of junior Mike Sedunov and sophomore Craig Sedunov will anchor the secondary. Kessler finished fourth on the team in tackles last year with 49 and added three interceptions. Craig Sedunov had 41 stops and two interceptions, while Mike Sedunov had 15 tackles and one pick before his season ended due to an injury.

Juniors Mitch Erdely and Nate Bucklew will battle Mike and Craig Sedunov for the starting safety positions, while senior Travis Dunn and sophomores Michael Digman and Michael Trunzo will compete for the open cornerback slot. Sophomore Nathan Harmotto is also expected to be in the mix.

"We definitely have some inexperience at the one cornerback position, but Chris is a great leader and will help those guys adjust," noted Sirianni. "Craig had an All-PAC year as a freshman and Mike has battled back strong from his injury. We have some talented guys in the secondary."

The defensive line is an area where Sirianni stresses that the Presidents must improve. Junior Jacob Bloomhuff had a breakout year in 2007 with 42 tackles (13.5 for a loss) and 4.5 sacks. Seniors Bradley Begonia, Brandon Bovina, Matt Ellinger, Thomas Gaul and Brandon Pfeifer, juniors Chad Boskat, Ryan Breen, Cory Denious and Ricky Morris will all be in the mix during preseason camp. The group will also be boosted by junior Brendan O'Mahony, an All-PAC running back last year, who has switched positions.

"We feel we have underachieved in this area in recent history, but we have talent," said Sirianni.

Senior Zack Zebrasky will handle the punting chores for the fourth consecutive season. He has averaged 35.8 yards on 98 career punts. Junior Chuck Grabner booted six field goals as a first-time starter in 2007 and finished third on the team in scoring with 78 points.

The focus during the first day of preseason camp will not be any different than the previous five under Sirianni. W&J's 23rd PAC Championship would earn a trip back to the playoffs where the ultimate goal would once again begin.

"It is often a cliché, but we have to play one game at a time to get back to the position we were in last year," concluded Sirianni. "The teams in the PAC improve every year. Waynesburg has an outstanding football team. We have to play great football to get back to the playoffs. This senior group is determined to get us there."

COACHING STAFF



MIKE SIRIANNI HEAD COACH

Mike Sirianni enters his sixth season as the 31st head football coach in Washington & Jefferson College history in 2008.

The 36-year-old head coach has won more games through five seasons than any coach in W&J history with a record of 50-8. He has also guided the Presidents to five consecutive postseason appearances.

Sirianni is third on W&J's all-time coaching victory list and can move into second place, passing D.C. Morrow (52-20-5) with three more wins. His winning percentage (.862) is the highest in school history among W&J coaches with five or more years of experience.

Sirianni has helped the Presidents reach the NCAA Division III playoffs in each of the past four seasons. Only five other schools in the nation have accomplished this feat.

Since Sirianni's arrival at Washington & Jefferson, the Presidents have shattered 81 individual or team offensive records. Sirianni has a knack for developing some of the nation's top quarterbacks as Brian Dawson '03, Chris Edwards '06 and current signal caller Bobby Swallow '09 hold nearly every record in W&J history. The trio has combined to throw for over 23,000 yards 250 touchdowns.

In 2007, Sirianni earned his third Presidents' Athletic Conference Coach of the Year award after leading W&J to its ninth undefeated regular season (2nd under Sirianni) in school history. Washington & Jefferson ranked second in the nation in total offense (518.7 ypg) and fourth in scoring (46.2 ppg).

The 2006 Presidents won the PAC title and won 10 consecutive games after dropping its season opener. Sirianni helped W&J reach the second round of the NCAA Division III playoffs and his offense committed the fewest turnovers in the nation with only 10 in 12 contests.

The Presidents finished the 2005 campaign with the sixth-best total (501.8 ypg) and passing (327.3 ypg) offenses in NCAA Division III. The 501.8 yards per game set a new school record which was broken last season. W&J also finished fourth in the country with an average of 41.9 points per contest.

In 2004, Sirianni helped W&J set a new school record with 12 victories after the Presidents advanced to their quarterfinals of the NCAA Division III playoffs for the first time since 1995. W&J also strung together a school-record 12-game win streak.

The former Washington-Greene County College Men's Coach of the Year led W&J to a 9-2 overall record in his inaugural season as a head coach and helped the Presidents claim the ECAC Southwest Region Bowl Game with a 41-19 victory at Wilkes.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Sirianni brought yearly national recognition to W&J's offensive unit from 1999-2002. He has been credited with the development of former W&J quarterback Brian Dawson, who finished his career with 10,259 passing yards, which is the fifth-highest total in NCAA Division III history.

Washington & Jefferson ranked fifth in the country in total offense in 2000, averaging 500.8 yards per game. W&J also rewrote the school's offensive record books, breaking 17 team and individual records. He helped Dawson lead all NCAA divisions (I, II or III) in passing efficiency with a rating of 201.5.

In 1998, he served as the offensive coordinator at Wilkes, where he helped the

Colonels achieve national rankings in pass offense and passing efficiency.

Prior to coaching at Wilkes, Sirianni spent three years as the wide receivers coach at his alma mater, Mount Union. During his stint as a coach, the Purple Raiders won national championships in 1996 and 1997. Before his time at Mount Union, he also served one year on the staff at Ithaca as a graduate assistant coach, while earning his master's degree in exercise and sports management.

As a player, Sirianni was a three-year starter and two-time All-Ohio Athletic Conference selection as a wide receiver and won a national championship in 1993. He also was a four-time conference triple jump champion on the Mount Union track team.

Sirianni, his wife, Jennifer, and his daughters, Jenna and Jordan, reside in Hopewell, Pa.

TODD YOUNG, ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

Todd Young begins his ninth season on the W&J football staff, serving as the offensive and recruiting coordinator. In addition, Young is also assistant head coach for the sixth-straight year.

Young played an important role in the development of three All-America linemen, Chris Hickey, Chris Teter and Matt Houy, during the past three seasons. Houy and classmate Dave Bucar are preseason D3football.com All-Americans this year.

His role as the recruiting coordinator may be most important to the football program. During his eight years on the staff, Young has recruited some of the best players to ever suit up in the red and black.

He came to W&J from his alma mater, Hiram College, where he doubled as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator since 1996. A 1996 graduate, he earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education. As a player at Hiram, Young was a three-year starter and a two-year captain on the offensive line. He also became the first player in school history to compete in a postseason national all-star game in the 1995 National All-Star Classic.

In addition to football, Young also was the head softball coach for Hiram in 2000. He helped lead the Terriers to a fourth-place conference finish, which was the team's best finish over a decade.

A member of the American Football Coaches Association, Young also spent two seasons as the W&J head men's lacrosse coach as the program's first coach.



CASEY GOFF, CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Casey Goff was promoted to Co-Defensive Coordinator at Washington & Jefferson in 2008. He joins Matt Caponi as the co-defensive coordinator for the 2008 season.

In addition to his coordinator responsibilities, Goff will focus on the Presidents' defensive line. Last year, Goff helped the W&J defense rank 25th in NCAA Division III with 31 turnovers gained. W&J allowed 18.6 points and 316.6 yards per contest last year.

Goff came to W&J last season from Rhodes College (Tenn.) where he spent one year as the defensive line coach. Rhodes ranked fifth in the nation in total defense (199.6 ypg) and led the Southern Collegiate

Athletic Conference with 32 sacks.

Prior to his stint at Rhodes, Goff worked two seasons as the defensive line/assistant strength coach at Cortland State (N.Y.). Goff helped the Dragons reach the 2005 NCAA Division III playoffs and coached a unit which ranked second in the nation in rushing defense (40.9 ypg). He also played a role in the development of All-American and East Region Defensive Player of the Year Adam Haas.

Goff, a native of Montrose, Pa., also has experience in coaching football at Mansfield, Susquehanna and Muhlenberg. A 2001 graduate of Susquehanna, Goff was a three-year letterwinner for the Crusaders' defense as a defensive lineman and linebacker. Following his senior season, he was honored with the team's Coaches' Award.



MATT CAPONI, CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Matt Caponi returns for his third season on the Presidents' coaching staff in 2008. During the offseason, Caponi was elevated to the co-defensive coordinator position where he will team with Casey Goff.

The Baldwin High School graduate coached the Washington & Jefferson defensive backs in each of the last two seasons. In 2007, W&J intercepted 19 passes which ranked as the 26th best total in NCAA Division III.

Under Caponi's guidance, W&J also ranked 20th in the country in 2006 with 20 interceptions.

Caponi arrived at W&J from Mount Union College where he spent two seasons as an assistant coach. In 2005, he helped guide the Purple Raiders to the NCAA Division III National Championship.

Caponi played four years of football at Mount Union from 2000-2003. During his career as a free safety, the Purple Raiders won three national titles.

As a junior, Caponi was an Honorable-Mention All-Ohio Athletic Conference honoree. In 2003, he was selected to the Second Team All-OAC squad.

MIKE DIANGELO WIDE RECEIVERS

Mike DiAngelo is back for his second season as a member of the Presidents' coaching staff in 2008. DiAngelo works with the team's wide receivers.

DiAngelo teamed with Head Coach Mike Sirianni to help W&J rank second in the nation in total offense with 518.7 yards per game.

DiAngelo spent the 2006 season as an assistant football coach at Division II Concord University (W. Va.) where he worked primarily as the team's quarterbacks coach. He also assisted with the special teams units.

DiAngelo was a four-year member of the Baldwin-Wallace (2002-2005) football program and a two-year starting quarterback. As a junior, the Steubenville, Ohio native threw for 1,249 yards and eight touchdowns. During his sophomore season in 2003, the Yellow Jackets earned a bid to the NCAA Division III playoffs.

DiAngelo graduated with a bachelor's degree in sport management.



TERRY GEORGE QUARTERBACKS

Terry George is a veteran football coach in western Pennsylvania in the high school and collegiate ranks who comes back for his sixth season on the W&J staff in 2008. George will serve as the team's quarterback coach.

Prior to his arrival at W&J, George served three years as the co-offensive coordinator at Carlynton where he helped lead the Cougars into the WPIAL and PIAA playoffs in 2001.

He also was the head coach at Ambridge High School from 1997-2000 as well as the head coach at West Allegheny High School from 1994-1998 where he was twice named the Three Rivers Conference Coach of the Year.

In between his two stints as head coach, George spent two seasons as the co-offensive coordinator at Bethany College. He is a 1979 graduate of West Liberty College.



MARK DEROSA RUNNING BACKS

Mark DeRosa returns to Washington & Jefferson College for his second season in his second stint as an assistant coach in 2008. He previously worked six seasons for the Presidents' football program as the defensive line and linebackers coach.

DeRosa was the defensive coordinator at Chartiers-Houston High School for the 2005 and 2006 seasons.

He has also coached previously at Avella High School and Trinity High School, working with the defensive line and linebackers. He was defensive coordinator for four years at Avella.

DeRosa was a two-time all-conference and all-county linebacker at Chartiers-Houston. He earned a degree in drafting at the Washington Institute of Technology and is also a certified strength and conditioning coach.



JUSTEN STICKLEY DEFENSIVE LINE

Justen Stickley is in his first season with the Presidents' football program. Stickley will concentrate on coaching the W&J defensive linemen.

Stickley is a 2007 graduate of Mount Union College where he was a four-year letter winner for the Purple Raiders. Mount Union claimed NCAA Division III titles during his junior and senior seasons (2005, 2006).

Stickley totaled 121 tackles, including 43 for a loss, and 17.5 sacks during his collegiate career. Mount Union posted a 54-3 overall record during that time. The Purple Raiders made the national semifinals in each of his three seasons and advanced to the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl three times (2003, 2005, 2006). In 2006, the three-time All-Ohio Athletic Conference selection was chosen as a D3football.com First Team All-American.

After graduating with a degree in sociology, Stickley played one season for the Canton Legends of the American Indoor Football Association.



FRANK SWARDEN DEFENSIVE CONSULTANT

A veteran among western Pennsylvania football coaching circles, Frank Swarden returns for his second stint as an assistant coach at Washington & Jefferson College in 2008.

Swarden spent two seasons as an assistant coach 30 years ago, serving as the offensive line coach and then the defensive coordinator in 1978.

After leaving W&J, Swarden became the head coach at McGuffey High School from 1979-2001. He is the school's all-time coaching victories leader (122-98-6). In 1994, Swarden helped McGuffey win the WPIAL AAA Championship.

DR. TORI HARING-SMITH PRESIDENT

Dr. Tori Haring-Smith became Washington & Jefferson College's 12th president in January 2005.

Dr. Haring-Smith holds doctoral and master's degrees from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and a bachelor's degree from Swarthmore College. Prior to coming to W&J, Dr. Haring-Smith was vice president for educational affairs at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon. In that role, she worked with faculty and deans to identify and fund institution-wide initiatives and to raise the national visibility of the college, helping to set a university record for fundraising in a single year (\$21 million in 2002-03). She also served Willamette as dean of the College of Liberal Arts, in which position she increased faculty diversity, extended benefits to part-time faculty, and restructured the office to better serve at-risk students.

Dr. Haring-Smith's academic background is in theatre and writing. She is a noted director, author, and speaker, having presented more than 150 lectures and workshops, published 10 books and numerous articles on topics ranging from curriculum reform to drama to pedagogy. Dr. Haring-Smith has also had three play translations widely distributed in the United States and has been recognized by the Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle and *LA Weekly*. She spent 16 years teaching theatre and writing at Brown University, where she funded, established, and administered the Rose Writing Fellows Program, a cross-curricular writing and speaking initiative. She also chaired the Department of Performing and Visual Arts at the American University in Cairo, Egypt, and served as artistic director for the Wallace Theatre in Cairo.

As executive director of the Thomas J. Watson Foundation, Dr. Haring-Smith helped make it possible each year for sixty Thomas J. Watson Fellows to pursue independent research outside the United States for one year following their college graduation. A recipient of the Watson Fellowship when she was at Swarthmore, Dr. Haring-Smith has a passion for the educational value of international exploration. She has traveled extensively across the world, having visited Afghanistan, Iran, India, Sri Lanka, and Cambodia among other countries.

As W&J's president, Dr. Haring-Smith is dedicated to bolstering already strong academic programs, bringing faculty salaries into parity with those of colleagues nationally, adding support to student life initiatives, increasing diversity on campus, developing a stronger emphasis on global issues, and growing the College's endowment. She plans to continue W&J's campaign to renew and grow its historic campus, initially focusing on the funding and building of a new science facility and recreational center.

A nationally recognized advocate for the liberal arts, Dr. Haring-Smith serves the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) as a SAGE (Strategies for Achieving Greater Expectations) consultant and as a mentor and coach for the Institute on Campus Leadership for Sustainable Innovation. She was also a national panel member for Greater Expectations, AAC&U's national report on liberal education in the 21st century. In 2003, she was a peer evaluator for the U.S.-Middle East Universities Partnership Program.

Dr. Haring-Smith is married to Robert Haring-Smith, a computer consultant and native of the Pittsburgh area. Their son, Whitney, is a student at Yale University.



BILL DUKETT DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Bill Dukett was named as the Director of Athletics in January of 2006.

Dukett began his career at W&J in 1982 where he served as the associate head coach for the Presidents' football team. As a member of the coaching staff, Dukett helped lead W&J to a record of 137-37-2, including 14 Presidents' Athletic Conference Championships and two appearances in the NCAA Division III National Championship Game.

Dukett also served as the head track and field coach from 1982-1992 and the head men's and women's golf coach from 1992-2003. In golf, Dukett's teams claimed six PAC titles and he was honored as the PAC Coach of the Year six times. In 1998, Dukett recruited for and started the first women's golf team in school history.

After leaving the coaching ranks in 1998, Dukett spent four years as the assistant director of alumni relations where he organized and staffed alumni events nationwide. In 2002, Dukett became a major gift officer in the development office, a position he currently holds. Dukett served as the lead gift officer and advocate in the funding of Ross Memorial Park and Alexandre Stadium, which are the homes of the Presidents' men's and women's soccer, baseball and lacrosse teams.

Prior to his arrival at Washington & Jefferson College, Dukett spent time as the head football coach at Parkland High School (1978-1982) and Palmerton High School (1975-1978). At Parkland, he also chaired the health and physical education department. From 1970-1975, Dukett assisted with the football and basketball programs at Phillipsburg High School in New Jersey.

At East Stroudsburg, Dukett was a three-time Honorable Mention All-America quarterback. A member of the ESU Hall of Fame, Dukett also played two years of basketball for the Warriors.

CAMERON STADIUM



In 1885, Washington & Jefferson College purchased eight acres of the old Washington Fairgrounds on the south side of the City of Washington to use the property as a site for football games.

Since then, the facility that was once known as College Park has been the site of numerous historic collegiate and high school games. Dozens of legendary players and coaches, from George Gipp and Knute Rockne to John Heisman, Wilbur "Pete" Henry and "Deacon Dan" Towler, have walked the sidelines at the facility that was renamed College Field in 1920.

Before the 1999 season, College Field was redesigned and expanded, thanks to a commitment of \$2.5 million from Don and Sally Cameron, Dick and Edwina Cameron, James and Nancy Cameron, Steven and Diane Cameron and Lynn Cameron and family to update and enhance the aging facility. The gift, one of the five largest in the history of the College, underscores the singular partnership that exists between the College and the community.

In phase one of the restructuring, an eight-lane, all-weather outdoor track was added as well as a new playing surface, FieldTurf, being installed. The new surface caught on around the nation and is now widely used in many NFL training complexes as well as Division I, II and III college stadiums. Enhanced seating on the visitor sides was added in addition to a brand new large scoreboard in one endzone.

Debuting in 2000 was phase two of the restructuring of Cameron Stadium. A total facelift of the entire stadium was done, which included newly expanded locker room areas, a women's locker room, a state-of-the-art press box, V.I.P. luxury suites and two new concession stands. The project also updated the restroom facilities, greatly increasing restroom areas for all fans. Three new ticket booths were added to make it easier for fans to get in and out of the stadium. For media personnel, space for television and radio broadcasts is included in the press box. A media room for postgame interviews as well as a conference room were added. The completion of the Washington & Jefferson Athletic Hall of Fame, including the Eaton/Gentile Hall of Fame Room at Towler Hall, has also helped current students, alumni and fans honor and appreciate those from the past who played, coached and supported W&J athletics. Finally, about 1,000 seats were expanded to the home bleacher side.

Five years ago, the locker room and training facilities underneath the home bleachers were renovated and upgraded. In 2003-2004, the entire track was resurfaced and repainted.

Cameron Stadium is one of the top facilities in all of Division III. Future Presidents' squads will now look to add to W&J's storied football tradition of success in Cameron Stadium.
